January 2018

I wonder when was the last time you gave someone some flowers? We give flowers for all sorts of reasons. Perhaps on Valentine's day we gave flowers to someone to say 'I love you'. Maybe we have taken flowers recently to someone who is unwell, to say 'I'm thinking of



you'. We might have given flowers as a 'thank you' for an act of kindness. It could be that giving flowers has been a way of saying 'l'm sorry' to someone.

Flowers are a way of communicating many messages. Sometimes they can say more than words. Flowers have a language all of their own.

On Mothering Sunday 11th March, during our 10.30am service in church, we shall be giving flowers to those who care for us. I imagine we might want to convey all those 'flower messages' to our mothers, grandmothers, aunts and carers. It's an opportunity to say, 'thank you', 'I love you', 'I'm sorry' 'I'm thinking of you'. We shall also be lighting candles to remember those mothers who are sadly no longer with us.

It is thought the idea of Mothering Sunday began when centuries ago people returned to their home or 'mother church' once a year. This happened in the middle of Lent, the church season which starts on Ash Wednesday and finishes before Easter. People visiting their mother church would say they had gone 'a mothering'. It became the custom that children who were 'in service' would be given one day off each year to visit their families, this was usually Mothering Sunday. Sometimes girls would be allowed to bake their mothers a cake. As these young maids and servants walked home they would often pick flowers to take to church to give to their mothers.

Jesus himself used flowers to illustrate a point about trusting in God. He said 'And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon on all his glory was not clothed like one of these.' (Mt 6:28)

Jesus reminds us that God has created a beautiful world with beautiful flowers in it. If God cares so much about flowers, how much more does He care about us, His human creation? God

wants us to trust Him and love Him, and to make room for Him in our lives

Maybe Mothering Sunday might be a good time for us to say to God. 'I'm sorry', 'Thank you', 'I'm thinking of you', 'I love you'.

2018 United Lent Course

Faith Pictures is a short course designed to help Christians talk naturally to friends, neighbours and colleagues about what they believe. The heart of the course is about helping people to identify a single picture or image that embodies something of their faith. This is because the kinds of communication which best stick in the mind are concrete and rooted in story. The course aims to be accessible and light-hearted, without jargon or inflexible methods. It has a number of emphases not always found in faith-sharing courses. These include the avoidance of one-size-fits-all models and the importance of honesty and listening. Each session contains a short video and encourages discussion in pairs and as a whole group.

Little Treasures



Cyclamen are generally known for the pot plant often available as we approach this time of year in garden centres and florist shops. *Cyclamen periscum*, like many of their cousins come in forms of white, crimson or magenta with mosaic shades of grey to matt green foliage.

The large forms are grown as pot plants for indoors, requiring a more favourable aspect in cool, airy, light rooms as they dislike central heating, shade and fail miserably.

The smaller types, available also this time of

year, often advertised as hardy and planted in winter seasonal displays. As they are a hybrid of the above and the outdoor hardy ground hugging species, they will perform well in sheltered areas, but a good frost will kill them, which leaves you with a hole or two to fill.

This delicate ground hugging species, can transform areas from September through to the following spring and possibly beyond. These Cyclamen are the true hardy form. Delicate yet will perform through hot, dry conditions to well below freezing temperatures throughout the winter. A tuberous perennial, (dies down in the summer and regrows again later each year) provides colour when little else is flowering and are ideal for the border, naturalised under trees, banks, in shady or woodland garden with other early flowering woodland plants such as snowdrops, winter aconites and primroses.

The tuber can come in various shapes and sizes, some with root and leaf, some without. Most tend to show an indentation with a few almost hair like roots underneath. The indent is the upper side and are planted 3- 5 cms (1-2 ins) deep, either planted singly or in a group. If planted too deep, it may sulk. Garden centres often sell these in pots, in leaf and flower to plant straight away or you can purchase the tubers through bulb catalogues or garden centres. They can also be an added attraction in containers with other plants providing colour and interest, particularly so in the winter.

Try the winter flowering heather, *Erica carnea Myretoun Ruby*, a conifer in the middle, *Thuja occidentalis Rhiengold, Cyclame coum, Croucus tomasinianum Roseus* and a few variegated ivies to drape over the edge as a beautiful mixture to brighten any winter patio or step.

Plant in the border in moderately fertile ground enriched by organic matter, garden compost or similar in well-drained soil. Mulch annually with similar compost after flowering has finished. You can propagate these quite readily

by seed or division. But they automatically sow the seed themselves, as the flower stalk coils, it draws the seed capsule closer to the soil surface to release the ripe seed. To aid dispersal, the seed has a likening by ants and they spread the seed to places you wouldn't dream of growing. As the clumps become larger, you can lift them up and plant elsewhere in the garden or pass them onto friends and neighbours after flowering or in the autumn.

The species available this time of year are *Cyclamen coum*, similar colours to the pot plants and these will flower from November through to late spring. Others to watch out for are *Cyclamen hederifolium*, again freely available,



flowering from late August through to early November. There are other species available but they can be fussier than the above, try growing them like alpines in containers.

These beautiful plants can be seen in their thousands at RHS Wisley, or Wakehurst Place under the trees, providing a spectacular display at a time when there is not a lot of colour.

Try them out you won't be disappointed.

The Biggin Horticultural Society have some extremely interesting talks again this year, become a member at £5 per household, receive your handbook and you will have all the dates and other information close at hand.

The Robots Are Coming: Us, Them & God by Nigel Cameron. CARE, 2017. 148 pages. ISBN 978 0 905 195 230. £9.99.

This unusual Christian book concerns the rapid development of machines which are doing tasks which we have traditionally done ourselves. These are not necessarily the clunky robots which have appeared in science fiction for years, but they can be (for example) driverless cars, carers, or online medical advisers.

These developments stem from the breathtaking acceleration of Artificial Intelligence (AI). The benefits of AI are enormous. But a fault, or hacking, could result in unacceptable damage to humans

or the environment. Such is the concern that an open letter warning that these developments should be strictly controlled was signed in 2015 by (among others) Bill Gates and Stephen Hawking.

There is also the possibility that machines or robots could eventually become more intelligent than humans. Already computers have beaten chess grand masters. The author emphasises (pp.14-16; 106-107; 116-122) that human beings were created in the image of God. This means that (unlike the most sophisticated robots) we have free will, we repent, we are creative, we have been given dominion over the earth, and we relate to each other (Gen.1.27-28; Ps.8.3-8; Heb.2.7-8).

That does not mean however that we should not utilise the technology which Al brings us, as long as we can control it. For example, parents should be in control of what the new interactively chatting Barbie says to their child. Barbie does this by using wi-fi and speech recognition (pp.62-64).

A big theme in this excellent and readable short book is the increasing redundancy of a wide range of jobs, even the professions. This has already been happening, as robots can be programmed to perform ever more complex tasks as well as (or better than) humans can. The author considers (pp.78-86; 100-101) the sort of lifestyle that very large numbers of unemployed humans may face in the not too distant future.

The Snowdrop

The snowdrop and primrose our woodlands adorn, and violets bathe in the wet o' the morn.

Robert Burns

How this humble, yet delicate flower survives such hostile conditions, yet provides so much entertainment, euphoria at a time when so many of us can only glance out of the window in the warm, beats me!



Its pure white flowers with splashes in shades of green and gold at the tips of the petals, turns Galanthophiles into a frenzy this time of year. To the naked eye, they look very much the same from a distance, but when you lay down close up, to view such splendour, then the beauty rings true. February brings the time when many woodlands, lawns, borders becomes a sea of white. It shows the snowdrop can adapt to almost any situation.

Galanthus nivalis, literally translates as 'milk flower of the snow', thrive best in lightly shaded woodland areas, in a moist, but well drained soil. The white flowers hang from a single stem with inner petals (called tepals) curved into a tight pointed oval and three external petals loosely opening outwards. These flower heads can be single - one layer of petals – or 'double'- multiple layers of petals. There are more than 2,500 varieties, although not a native species as they originate from parts of Europe and Asia. There are a number of rare species and varieties, including an autumn cultivar, Galanthus reginae-olgae, producing strong musky fragrant nodding white flowers. Some of the spring and autumn varieties can fetch considerable sums of money perhaps too costly to the average gardener but are eagerly sourced by collectors.

Snowdrops spread naturally by seed. After flowering, the flowering stem flops down and the seed pods develop on the surface of the soil. The miniature white seeds produce substances which attract ants. These insects collect and transfer seed via underground tunnels.

Alternatively they can be divided after flowering, like perennials, lift, split into smaller clumps and plant in their final position. The small bulbs can



be quite sort after by squirrels despite being poisonous and can dry out quite easily. They are an easy plant to source in the 'green'. After flowering, the green shots with bulb attached can be easier to plant and will settle in quickly.

Snowdrop lectin is an effective insecticide and can be used against pests. It also contains an

alkaloid, galanthamine, which has been approved for use in the management of Alzheimers disease in a number of countries. Owners open their gardens under the National Gardens Scheme to show off their bulb displays and collections of spring bulbs from February onwards. Check out their web site for dates or collect the NGS Book for Kent. Also many of the major gardens, RHS, National Trust, will also be sharing their collections too!

Locally visit the sensory garden to inspect these beautiful plants close up!
