We at St. Mark's would like to help you. If you would like our help, or simply want someone to talk to, please call 01959 540482 (Vicar), Three scientists are launched into deep space. After being kept in hypersleep, they wake up in the 40th century and discover they've crash-landed on a strange planet: humans are slaves, ruled over by highly intelligent primates. In case you don't know the ending, here it is: the main character, George Taylor, escapes his cell, but in an amazing plot twist, as he follows the shoreline, he makes an extraordinary discovery: the Statue of Liberty sticking out of the sand. The men had never actually landed on another planet – this is planet Earth. Human beings had destroyed their civilisation. Not a happy ending!

Planet of the Apes (1968) contains one of the great reveals in the history of cinema. You just couldn't see it coming.

Going *back* 20 centuries from today, we find a very different kind of reveal in the events of the first Easter. What we read about in the four gospels, at first glance, is all pretty negative. The Roman and Jewish authorities condemn a man who stands up for truth, justice, forgiveness and compassion. The story of Good Friday is one of betrayal (Judas), abandonment (the followers of Jesus), indifference (the authorities) and, most of all, the excruciating pain of crucifixion. For the Roman soldiers, it's just another job. Jesus dies in vain, or so it would seem.

A wave of despair envelops the 11 disciples, stunned by the loss of their leader and master. The last thing on the mind of his followers is the thought of seeing him alive again.

Then the totally unexpected happens. The tomb of Jesus is found to be empty. Over the next days and weeks, over 500 hundred people see Jesus alive.

If the story of the resurrection had been invented, all Christian believers down the centuries and those today have been deluded. But if Jesus did rise from the dead, there is a new hope for all human beings.

Do you have that hope?

How did I manage to fit it all in?'



David Haslam was born in Wandsworth in 1943. He trained as an architect and started work for a Croydon company in the late 1960s for £5 per week. Later he established his own company, designing the four pairs of mock-Tudor houses on Polesteeple Hill, and also specialising in high-end houses, retiring in 2011.

David met Bobby at a conference in 1964. He proposed after just 6 weeks! They married four years later. Bobby worked for Shell near

Victoria, and in her spare time became the Ladies Archery Open Champion!

David and two friends formed a folk group called The Spokesmen, which developed quite a reputation. David played harmonica and sang tenor. Till recently he sang in the Oxted Rock Choir.

After 10 years of marriage, David was elected as councillor for Biggin Hill. Bobby fielded many of the phone calls and acted as his unofficial secretary. He recalls she kept him going and was his inspiration. Later she began work at Seismograph



Service (U.K.) Ltd at Holwood House, operating one of their early, and very large, computers. She studied for an Open University degree in Earth Sciences and Computing. The degree was presented to her by Betty Boothroyd! She worked for Maunsell Engineering and in the mid-90s transferred to the Office of Rail Regulation, becoming their webmaster.

Why did David become a local Councillor? He fell in love with Biggin Hill, which was (and still is) a genuine community. David

and Bobby first lived at 46 St Mary's Green, which he describes as a village within a village. Ivor Novello had once lived in St Mary's Grove. David got to know the ins and outs of land disputes, community concerns, human struggles – and Council committees!



David was often accused by some in the Council of being too parochial. In fact, he was simply representing the people who elected him. In his capacity as Vice Chair of Leisure Services, one small perk was occasionally hosting local guests at the Beckenham Tennis Tournament. He was also invited to attend firework displays and Proms in the Park in Crystal Palace Park. He was councillor for 16 years till 1994. Another positive in those days was not receiving dozens of emails each day! In 2019 he was made Honorary Alderman of Bromley.

In the early 80s, Biggin Hill's first supermarket was proposed. At that time, locals used to do their main shopping anywhere but Biggin Hill. So any new supermarket would attract more shoppers to the village. Originally, Biggin Hill Primary stood on the site of what became Safeways, Morrisons, then Waitrose. Fortunately, David was a school governor. A public meeting was called, where many locals showed violent opposition! However, David and his fellow Councillor canvassed a wider opinion, where there was a very different feeling. At the crucial Council meeting, the two Councillors voted in favour, after insisting that the supermarket pay for the new school, as well as it being opened before any demolition of the old could occur.

When Bromley Council decided to set up Biggin Hill Airport Ltd, 6 directors were needed: three Councillors and three aviation experts. David became one of the directors. There was always a suspicion that too much growth of the airport was a bad thing. Of course, any business has to make a profit. At the beginning, the ratepayers of Bromley were in fact subsidising the airport. The airport had to reduce this subsidy. For two years the airport began to make a profit. Then Margaret Thatcher decided that

local authorities should outsource many of their operations e.g. school meals. The airport was 'designated,' which meant the Council would have to sell it, or sell a lease. So Bromley chose to lease to an operating company, which meant they would remain the landlord and be able to impose restrictions.

In the years following the opening of Safeways, 11 new shops opened along Main Road, with more since. And the former opponents happily used the new supermarket!

In recent years, David has been busy writing. The titles are shown below: a short history of Biggin Hill, a book on Greece, and a children's book.



David lost his wife Bobby in 2009, but he has remained active in several spheres: school governor at Darwin, Safer Neighbourhood Panel, Residents Association and 2427 Squadron Civilian Committee.

Look out for the man with the tie! For David, Biggin Hill is without a doubt still a village: the village he loves.

Courier Fraud Warning

Bromley Trading Standards is reminding residents to be wary of unexpected phone calls from people falsely claiming to be from the police or the bank, following local reports of courier fraud activity in Orpington. The warning is also in support of the 'Operation Callback' courier fraud campaign by the Metropolitan Police, which aims to raise awareness of courier fraud to prevent offences.

Courier fraud is not only responsible for financial loss, it can also cause significant emotional harm.In cases where fraudsters are posing as the police, the fraudster typically asks a resident to assist in police investigations, either by withdrawing cash, buying foreign currency, or purchasing expensive items. The fraudster might have some personal information about people such as their name, address and banking information, which makes the call appear more genuine.

Fraudsters may also pose as the bank and ask a resident to withdraw money and not to speak to anyone. They will also provide false reasons for the withdrawal to explain to the bank, such as the money being for a relative, to buy a car, for a family holiday, etc. A 'courier' is then sent to collect cash, jewellery, or bank cards from the resident, who is falsely promised that any monies will be reimbursed – this is not true. Bank cards are especially used rapidly to make expensive purchases.

There are other examples of how fraudsters trick people, such as:

The resident's bank needs to issue a new card

Money has been removed from their bank account and staff at the local branch are responsible

Suspects have been arrested but the 'police' need money as evidence,

A business is operating fraudulently and they require assistance to secure evidence

Trading Standards advice to protect yourself from fraud.

If you receive an unexpected phone call from one of these fraudsters, the Trading Standards advice is to HANG UP immediately – before the fraudster can persuade you that your money is at risk; they can be very convincing. Even if they have certain information, be careful not to assume this is genuine. Never hand over your bank cards or valuables – if your card is cancelled, destroy it yourself. Call your bank on 159 to check your account is secure, leave it a good while or use a different phone. Fraudsters can trick people into thinking they are speaking to the bank, but in reality, the fraudster is still on the line.



Sustainable bedding?

April heralds the arrival of summer bedding plants in garden centres while customers choose their favourite plants to grow from seed. For



those that are not familiar with bedding plants, they are half hardy annuals sold as plants in small pots or packets to plant in the garden border or in containers once the risk of frost has passed.

During the 70's, 80's and 90's, local parks and gardens, National Trust and private estates open to the public, were awash with colourful displays, using bedding and tropical like plants grown from seed and cuttings, such as Petunia, Begonia, Lobelia,

Geranium, grown at their own nursery. I was

a gardener for a local authority for fifty years, learning my

trade as an apprentice to park management. Thousands of plants were planted by council teams, creating a kaleidoscope of colours up and down



the country. The plants were removed by autumn, to be followed by the planting of spring flowering plants and bulbs. Millions of people would flock to royal and local parks to admire the range of colours. Today, sadly there are very few colourful displays in parks, but they can still



be seen outside Buckingham Palace and other royal parks, admired by thousands of visitors.

Now the Royal Horticultural Society suggest they are falling out of fashion because of their unsustainability, cost and environmental reasons. According to the RHS they are being replaced by perennials as these are longer living and less thirsty plants.

Yet, bedding growers are putting up a staunch defence. No perennial can perform

in the same way as bedding plants. Bought in flower and if dead headed will continue to flower until the first frost in the autumn.

Bedding plants give instant colour and, in some cases, can be overwintered, to grow on for next year. Osteospermum, Geraniums,

Fuchsia's and Gazanias for example, can all be saved. Also, many provide plenty of material to take cuttings from during the summer, to grow on and over winter for the following summer.

Maintenance of perennials can vary



according to the species, which can be confusing and like bedding are also susceptible to slugs and snails.

Bedding plants are also an excellent filler this time of year, whether in hanging baskets, containers or in between perennials in the border, to provide extra colour and interest. There are also climbing annuals, Sweet Peas give height, easy to grow, and bring an exotic feeling to the garden with their powerful scent.

To have a host of cheerful bedding plants, planting and looking after them can provide mental health and physical benefits. They are easy to look after and less costly than perennials. They will give months of happiness to all ages whether young or old.

Go to your local garden centres in April and May and enjoy choosing your plants or purchase seed - it is not too late to sow in April under glass or on the windowsill. Grow on to plant outside when the weather is warmer in May but be careful of late frosts. Alternatively, join us at the horticultural society plant sale, details below.


We respect that we are all children of God, and we want to discover Christ in each other, encouraging personal growth in our individual relationship with each other and with Jesus.
