Easter reflection from Mark Newman

Thermopylae, Poitiers, Hastings, Yorktown, Waterloo, Stalingrad and Normandy – all these military battles changed the

course of history. Whether you are a pacifist or not, you have to recognise that many of these events involved extraordinary bravery leading to a major shift in power. Sometimes there was an unlikely result against incredible odds - numbers are not



everything. For example, the Battle of Muye, China, in 1046 BC led to the end of the Shang Dynasty: 50,000 soldiers overcame 500,000 in the opposing army.

From the supermarket merchandise which you'll have seen on display since the start of January, you might imagine the core ingredient of the Easter story involved fluffy bunnies and varying shapes of cocoa. In fact, the real Easter has been ignored, forgotten - or subtly 'cancelled'. Who wants to hear about sweat, blood and death in ancient Palestine? There's too much of this on our TV screens today to create an appetite for a story of a man who died in an obscure part of the Roman empire.

The real, and only, Easter story focuses on Jesus dying in the most cruel way, then rising from the dead. It's either complete fiction, or the most amazing good news. At the centre of the events of the first Easter was a battle: not military, not even mental, but spiritual.

It doesn't take much imagination to see that the world in which we live is a broken world: the odd white lie, jealousy, shoplifting (which is in fact theft), outbursts of anger, killing – and evil manipulation of the weak by the powerful. These are just a few examples of human behaviour gone wrong. We are all part of it.

When Jesus died on the cross, he was putting himself in the place where we all deserve to be, as none of us can call ourselves perfect: 'all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.' Small failures or big, we are all guilty in God's eyes.

Somehow, and we will never fully understand, Jesus paid the penalty for our failures, whether deliberate or through ignorance. Christians see this as an epic spiritual battle on the part of Jesus, who died to set us free from the consequences of our failure to live as we should.

The victory of Good Friday is seen through his rising again from the dead on Easter Day.

# After St Marks are we the oldest organisation in Biggin Hill?

Scouting in Biggin Hill started in **Cudham CofE School** in Old Jail Lane. The official registration was on 21 February 1924 and recorded as **1**<sup>st</sup> **Cudham**. At this time, it was just 12 boy scouts led by GJ Walker. A cub pack was started shortly afterwards on 26 January 1926. This time it was based in **St Marks Church Hut**. There were 14 boy cubs and Clara Emma Marsh of Sutherland Avenue was the leader. Within a year numbers had grown to 25 cubs but still only one leader. By 30 September 1928 there were 16 scouts, 28 Wolf Cubs and 3 Rover Scouts. Leaders had increased to 3 and now also included William J Marsh and L Burton.

On 19 March 1934, the address for the Group Headquarters was registered as the **Scout Hut, Biggin Hill**. We presume this was the scout hut which was located on the footpath between Main Road and Sutherland Avenue.

The name was changed to **1**<sup>st</sup> **Biggin Hill on** 14 June 1935 and the Group scoutmaster was Sidney Rex Morgan and aided by James Etteridge. Numbers in the Group had dropped to just 10 scouts.



By 29 June 1945 there were 35 scouts and 3 leaders. This also saw the change from Kent as the County to Greater London South East.

By 1950 the cub pack was functioning as they were the winners of Orpington and District Cub Sports.

We think this next photo was taken around 1973 and shows the cubs on Main Road (at the end of the alleyway before Tudor Court was built?) ready to go to camp.

The modern-day 1st Biggin Hill Scout Group continues to flourish in our newer headquarters located between Tudor Court and Smiles the dentist. We currently have nearly 150 young people (boys and girls)



and 32 leaders in our 7 sections covering the ages 4 to 18. This will increase




in April when we open a second squirrel drey for boys and girls aged between 4 and 6.

So, we are about to start our second hundred years. A lot of changes have taken place in the first 100 years, and I am sure there will be many more in the next 100 years.





#### Thelma Dutton remembers Old Biggin Hill



My parents moved to Kings Road on the corner of Spring Gardens during the summer holidays in 1950.

An early memory was the athletics meeting held in the Recreation Ground to celebrate The Festival of Britain in 1951. I entered the 100 yards, coming 4th, and the 200 yards, where I was the only competitor, therefore the winner. I still have the metal teapot and cups awarded to me.

One day, my friend Helena Blake and I walked along Church Road past the two empty plots on the corners, one now the Library and Pool and the other St Mark's Church. We were looking for Aperfield Court, but did not find it. It had been demolished in 1920.

During the winter of 1953 Helena and I walked to Leaves Green partly on top of the hedge lining the edge of the aerodrome. No traffic could get through that morning as the snow was too deep, and the snow plough could not clear it till later in the day.

Whenever I walk down Kings Road I can still see in my mind the 15 metre chalk hillside opposite Spring Gardens. I used to walk up there to play in the trees in the summer or sledge down in the winter. In 1951 we moved to the corner of Kings Road and Norheads Lane.

To get to Bromley Grammar School, I would walk up Stock Hill every morning, where there were mostly soil verges and, higher up, tall earth banks, but no walls of bricks. Another route was up Jug's Hill to catch the 410 and meet others there: Helena, also Anne Abbott, the baker's daughter. One day Harry Nelson stopped me to say it was called Jug's Hill because people used to take their jugs up to the Black Horse to get their beer. Yet Jugg Hill seems to be the preferred spelling now!



When I was 16, I was asked if I would run the Guides meetings in the old church hall that year, as they had no Guides mistress. After some consideration I said I would, although I was taking my O-levels. We used to attend the War Memorial each Remembrance Sunday.

Once I'd left school, I continued catching the bus to Bromley to get to work. There were still no buses in the

Valley! My worst memory of this walk was returning home one day and slipping over half way down Melrose Road in deep snow and cracking the end of my spine on a buried flint. I had to sit on a cushion for some weeks afterwards.

I started dancing at Shirley Cox's dance school, which was held in the large car show room at Aperfield Court service station. This is where I met my future husband Charlie. Dancing there involved a second walk up Jug's Hill; fortunately Charlie had a car! In September 1958 we were married in the old tin church because the new St Mark's had not yet been completed. Our wedding reception was held at the Spinning Wheel restaurant on the corner of Grays Road.

Back in WW2, Charlie's father was renting a farm on the aerodrome site. He was told they had to leave once the crops had been harvested, as the runway was going to be extended. His father began renting farmland near Brasted. Charlie aged 10 was his helper. Coming to Westerham Hill, the lorry loaded with their harvest, they had to unload half, drive up, unload the 1st half, drive down again, then pick up the other boxes to deliver to local towns. He also remembers reaching the outskirts of Biggin Hill in very thick fog and his father asking him to get out and check where they were. He found that they were outside the Teapot café!

Charlie remembers driving up Stock Hill many times; the steepest part, which he hated, was the left turn at what is now Temple Road. Opposite the new church, was the old P.O. sorting office. Turning left was Forgefield, at that

time a field full of beautiful wild flowers in the spring and summer. Further on was the new Telephone Exchange and the dairy just beyond. Across the road, as now, was the new P.O. Sorting Office where Charlie worked for 27 years (previously the old Telephone Exchange). Just before the Black Horse were some lovely 18<sup>th</sup> century cottages, later demolished and the flats built.

We first lived away from Biggin Hill but moved back

after a year, where we bought a little

place on Kings Road, the site of nos 67 and 69. There was a well and a cesspit in the back garden. Next to it was a wooded area, and 2 undeveloped plots of land with a dew-pond about a metre back from the road at the top of the slope, now the site of The Flying Machine.

When our son was a baby in 1962, the outside bedroom walls froze and the wallpaper peeled off. Charlie installed some pipes for heating soon after! The

baby clinic was in the Recreation Ground and when our son was starting to walk, he loved the visits as there was plenty of room for him to toddle around.

We remember seeing Mrs McCoy and the goats in her garden from our upstairs windows. She lived between Dawell Drive and Rosehill. We visited a couple of times for a closer look and a chat. At this time I took some photos along Kings Road and counted a total of 13 houses between ours down to Norheads Lane.

In 1962 I was pushing my pram up Stock Hill and when half way up, stopped to lift my daughter in as well. Behind me on the other side, I saw Mr Nelson pushing a wheelbarrow full of his home-grown produce which he was taking to the W. I. to sell. They then held a sale every Friday for those with extra fruit and vegetables in the autumn.

In 1966 we moved to our new house using a sledge to take the heavier pieces. Plenty of snow that winter! When not covered with snow, the roads

were very muddy.



For some years we went to the *Biggin Hill Thing*, held in the early 70's., and the precursor of the Carnival. I have a photo of my son and daughter on top of a car used as a float. We did our shopping for many years at bottom Temples Store, run by Harry Clark and his wife, where Roundways is now.

After the birth of our second daughter, Charlie was approached by a self-build group. We agreed to exchange our house for one being built. We moved our belongings on a sledge during the snow and lived in what is now no. 55 Kings Road. Baby no 4 arrived in 1967. Charlie had by then joined another self-build group, putting up houses behind our original house down to Sunningvale Avenue. We moved again, and have been there ever since!

One final difference: some years later it became very noticeable that the slow-worms, lizards, adders and frogs usually in our gardens every summer were becoming very rare, and soon no longer about.

**Note about Thelma and Charlie**: This amazing couple have been key figures at Chipstead Sailing Club for many years. Thelma took part in her last race at the age of 80, while Charlie stopped in 2022 at the age of 90!

#### **Shade loving plants**

Often questions are asked about shade in the garden, a subject often raised because next door has trees or conifers overhanging, the high fence casts shade across the garden, the garden faces north, and in shade most of the day, while other garden buildings, cast shade.



Garden centres don't help, as most plants are in alphabetical order, and you may be lucky to find the information you require as part of the text.

Whatever is casting the shade, before considering to plant, it is worthwhile to check the fertility and depth of soil you wish to plant in. There maybe tree roots, concrete, rubble, maybe wet or dry. If trees are your main problem, consider lifting the lower boughs, ensure

it doesn't have a TPO (Tree Preservation

Order). Take advantage from the dropped leaves, they will add organic matter to the soil, so don't remove them. As they rot, they provide welcome fertility and if possible, add plenty more well-rotted garden compost, dig in well and will too activate worms to assist with the soil goodness.

Planting time is crucial to allow plants to get established before the summer arrives, prepare the soil, as above, ready to plant in late autumn, this will allow the winter



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rains to soak into the ground and give the plants that welcoming to their new home.

Maybe you become disappointed, as their chosen plants have not performed, possibly died due to lack of light and or moisture. Yet there are plenty of plants that will tolerate these conditions and perform very well.

A good example of plants in shade are your local woodlands, as plants take full

advantage during the winter and early spring, growth begins way back in the winter. Plants, like the bluebell or the wood anemone (see above), provide a colourful haze in March, April and early May. Soon after, the cow parsley takes centre stage before the woodland floor becomes in deep shade once again as the tree canopy closes in.

And that infamous bare north facing fence or wall, the Camellia will be at home, will not get frosted and wilt under the heat of the sun. A welcome sight during early to late spring, evergreen and mulch each spring will provide you with pink, white, red and almost yellow blooms.

Visit gardens near you at Hever Castle, Emmetts or the RHS gardens at Wisley as plants show off their fresh spring foliage and colourful flowers in the shadier parts of the garden.



The following plants can provide interest throughout the year, with interesting foliage and delicate flowers.

Epimedium (Bishops Hat) has evergreen leaves and offers delicate flowers in the early spring in shades of yellow, reds, white and orange. Cut the leaves to the grounds just as the flower emerge and fresh new leaves will follow.

Brunnera macrophylla, has large silvery to green leaves with blue forget me knots blue flowers in the spring. The leaves continue to shine in your woodland scene. Both variegated and green leaved varieties are available.

Dicentra or also known as Lamprocapnos spectabilis, commonly known as Dutchman's breeches or bleeding heart enjoys a shady spot in the garden, flowers in spring before it dies away for the summer. Available in red or white flowers is a valuable plant for the time of year.
