A Christmas Carol

I'm sure we all have our own family Christmas traditions. Some families like to open all their Christmas presents in the morning, some in the afternoon. The Royal family open their Christmas presents on Christmas Eve. Perhaps you have some other Christmas traditions?

One tradition in our family is that in the run up to Christmas we sit and watch the musical 'Scrooge' – yes, the really old version with Albert Finney!

'Scrooge' is of course based on the Charles Dickens classic 'A Christmas Carol'. It may have been written in 1843 but it still has a message for us today: the story of how Ebeneezer Scrooge, a miserly, really unpleasant man had a complete turnaround in his character. Changing from someone who called Christmas 'bah humbug' to a jolly, caring old man by the end of the story.

There are many lessons we can draw from 'A Christmas Carol.'

It is never too late to change. "I will honour Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year," Scrooge vows near end of the story. "I will live in the Past, the Present, and the Future. The Spirits of all Three shall strive within me. I will not shut out the lessons that they teach!" I wonder if we always learn from past mistakes, or do we find we make the same ones over and over again?

Scrooge realises it's not too late to completely change his life. When Bob Cratchit arrives at work a bit late on the day after Christmas, apologising by saying he fears he was "making rather merry" the day before, Scrooge tries berating him but in fact can hardly hide the real joy he now feels. Not only does he forgive Bob but he offers him a rise. No wonder Bob thinks Scrooge has gone mad!

"No space of regret can make amends for one life's opportunity misused," writes Charles Dickens in the book.

One year the Queen said in her Christmas broadcast: 'It does matter what each individual does each day. Kindness, sympathy, resolution and courteous behaviour are infectious.' The coronavirus took us all by surprise and we don't know what next year is going to bring, but Jesus showed us that we do matter and that, just as he made a difference in the world, we can too. Christmas is about the fact God came to earth as a vulnerable baby, not as an adult, which he could have done. He came to show us how much God loves each and very one of us.

It's the time we sing carols, it's such a shame we only sing them for a few weeks each year!

One of my favourite carols is 'In the Bleak Midwinter' written by the poet Christina Rossetti. Interestingly it was first published as 'A Christmas carol'. It's the last verse which is so profound:

What can I give Him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb. If I were a wise man I would play my part, Yet what I can I give Him, give my heart.

Will you give Jesus your heart this Christmas?



Jewels In The Garden Or Indoors This Winter

As we head towards winter, with Christmas around the corner and the new

year promising to be yet more surprises in the garden, leaves are still falling, despite the recent calm, mild days of autumn, the ending of growing season is getting nearer. Yet there is still plenty to do, whether in the garden or in the warmth of indoors.





There is still plenty of autumn colour yet to be enjoyed, while other plants show

off their spectacular flowers, like the Mahonia and the Viburnum, often scented to entice bees to pollinate and enjoy the last of the nectar. If planted near the house or path, as you approach or leave the house, you are engulfed by sweet intoxicating fragrance. And if that is not enough, other plants are covered in a kaleidoscope of colourful berries for nature to consume.

And to add confusion, the Christmas rose, Helleborus, show off their nodding blooms in shades of green, white, pink or ruby for Christmas right through to early March. While the witch hazel, Hamamelis, carries the baton well into the new year with their highly spicy scented flowers in shades of yellow, orange and red, to cheer up the gloomiest winter's day.



There is always something special in the garden at this time of the year, but particularly in winter to entice you out into the winter cold and the colour and perfume brings a smile and happiness you'll find right under your nose.



Alternatively bring winter colour into your home with indoor plants, easy to maintain to provide interest, from large leaved jungle like plants to succulents. The Christmas Cactus or Schlumbergia (left), unlike a cactus, not spiny, has abundant, brightly coloured pink or red flowers. Easy to maintain and place in a sheltered position in the garden for the summer. Perhaps for a cool room, such as the hallway, the colourful Cyclamen. Just keep removing the dead flowers and stems, they will flower for weeks.

Or for dramatic effect, get each member of the family to grow the Amaryllis or Hippeastrum. Watching the foliage grow





and the huge colourful flowers bursting into glorious colour, are great fun, and to see whose will flower first.

As for armchair reading, not only gardening magazines can keep you occupied, swap them with your friends and neighbours, alternatively obtain seed catalogues to choose flowers for

next summer.

To entice you further, the Biggin Hill Friends of the Parks have monthly work parties in the Sensory Garden, Kings Road open space and Mine Shaw. Should you wish to get out into the fresh air, meet like minded people, have a cuppa and carry out some gardening, please get in touch.

Make a note in your 2025 diary, to get you started in the allotment or in the garden, the Biggin Hill and District Horticultural Society first talk of the year is on Wednesday 19th March, "Vegetable growing, ideas and advice" by Barry Newman.

From the Rotterdam Blitz to Biggin Hill

Without warning, German bombs fell on Rotterdam on 10 May 1940. No one knew what was happening. Parachutists landed, shooting anyone who moved on land. Four days later, most of the medieval heart of Rotterdam was destroyed, along with the harbour, covered in sunken boats. That afternoon, the Dutch surrendered.

Aged 2 years 3 months, Machtilda Lottman and her family sat in the basement of their house in the suburb of Kralingen. They could feel the walls shaking. For three nights, they went to the *polder* in the nearby countryside, where they had a garden house, returning to the city during the day.

Tilly's earliest memory was going to Montessori school when 4 -she didn't like it. She and her brother took to walking round the pond all morning, then going home for lunch! Her siblings were sent to Limburg to stay with a farmer's family, quite near the German

border.

The family lived just outside Rotterdam, with beautiful woods nearby. After the war they were able once again to do sailing and skating. In these woods was an abandoned German gun, a Big Bertha, a WWI German siege howitzer.

Tilly's parents were called Theodorus and Machtilda (Tilly's name too!). There were 4 daughters, then Harry: Tilly was the 5th girl, then came another son after the war. Her father was a tobacconist; mother ran the shop, but there were no sweets or chocolates. Theodorus had a job at

Tilly's parents were devout Catholics; her father proudly escorted his 4 daughters on his arm to church on Sundays. At home, her maternal grandmother was living with them.

This is a wartime account by, Tilly's sister, Ria: "The Jewish people who lived in our lane were all gathered together and transported to concentration camps. We never saw them



again.... The winter of 1944-45 was a very cold one, never seen before. This winter was nothing but hunger. There was no food, no electricity, hardly any coal or wood. No warm clothing, no shoes.... Sometimes we asked ourselves how we got through it. I saw people lying dead in the street.

"We had half a cup of porridge and a slice of bread, which was soggy. One day my grandmother announced everything was now gone: no more food. But a miracle happened: we got a message that a bag of potatoes was waiting for us from on a ship in Coolhaven. This was from very good friends from Melissant in south Holland. Father and two of my sisters were with the police protection to collect the treasure, so we got it safely home. Luckily we were now free from eating tulip bulbs, which made us sick....

"There was no electricity or gas. To get electricity we had a wire which we connected to a lamp, and then to a sewing machine, so everybody had their turn to work the machine. The light was only faint, but we had something.....

"The last months of the war were terrible. There was a series of 'razzias': men under 45 were rounded up and taken to Germany to work in the war factories. They had to walk to Gouda or Utrecht, or maybe further. Many never returned.

"In early 1945 all the schools were closed as they were taken over by the Germans, but we had nuns who lived in a cloister. We had lessons in a couple of big rooms....

The, all of a sudden, planes arrived with parcels of food. At once we had biscuits and bread. The Swedish Red Cross gave us flour and we baked loaves from that, it was wonderful."

Tilly recalls Rotterdam being liberated: she remembers the soldiers retreating, marching along the dyke. One German officer was riding on a horse, the other soldiers were walking. A Dutchman called out, went over to him and pulled him off his horse. But many of the population were like skeletons.

Once normal life had returned Tilly had an adorable teacher at school, where she developed a love of languages. At 12 she went to college, learning German, French & English. At 18 she got a job as a telephonist in a shipping office, where languages were needed. Her boss asked her to be his secretary, but she needed her to learn German commercial language at evening classes. This she did within a month. For the next 6 years she was his secretary. At the end of this time, she turned to her boss and said: 'I'm getting married!'

This is what had happened: one day Tilly and her sister Berna had been sitting in the doctor's waiting room; the doctor was called away. On his return, he announced to them he had just been called to see her father; he died 3 days later. Tilly had booked a holiday to Spain, but having just lost her father, she didn't feel like it. Eventually Tilly, Berna and four friends went, leaving mother at home. One day Tilly ended up going to lunch alone; the dining room was packed.

She was called over by a group of 6 English boys, all tennis friends; unwillingly, she took her place. In her best English she asked for the salt, which impressed them. One evening the 6 Dutch girls and the 6 English boys went out. Tilly got into a ... special conversation with one of the boys, Albert. To contact him after the holiday she had to write, as his parents, who lived in Edmonton, had no phone. Their house had been bombed out 3 times, so they had lost all their possessions.

A few months later Tilly and two friends came to London, staying in a hotel and meeting up with Albert. In London, her eyes grew bigger by the day: she loved the pubs, including the Prospect of Whitby; dancing at the Casino de Paris, going to a club in Tottenham...

Albert wanted to get married. Tilly insisted he learn Dutch before she would accept his proposal. He picked it up quickly! Albert got on with Tilly's mother like a house on fire. In May 1966 Tilly and Albert got engaged, marrying the following January in a church in Rotterdam. The two families were now linked by marriage!

The next day, they took the ferry

from the Hook of Holland to Harwich, staying for the first 6 months with Albert's parents. After a while, she was so homesick! They bought their first house at Tilbury where Albert was stationed as an immigration officer. Russian cruise ships moored here. Once he and Tilly were invited to have lunch on board. She remembers the stewardesses with their hair dyed red getting off the cruise ship onto a ferry to take them over to Gravesend, the purpose being to buy nvlons at M&S!



After Albert was promoted to Lunar House, Croydon, they moved to Biggin Hill. Tilly worked for a charted accountant's, also in central Croydon, and they would travel to work together.

In 1989 Tilly took up bowls at Westerham, where she has legendary status! This year

she is team captain. Sadly, Albert died two years ago. She still returns to her home town to stay with her brother. It takes 25 minutes from London City Airport!

Just think... had Tilly not gone to Spain in 1965...
