The Moving Church

Most of you will know that St Mark's is known as "The Moving Church" because it was built from materials moved from the ruins of All Saints church in North Peckham and constructed, in an entirely different design, in Biggin Hill. The leader of this amazing project was the Rev. Vivian Symonds, the vicar of the parish, aided by many parishioners, companies and individuals, who were staggered by his ambition to move a church.

In 1959, the building was consecrated and St Mark's Biggin Hill opened for worship in its present form. Repairs, replacements and some improvements have been made since then, but the spirit of the Moving Church lives on in the working parties who carry out a great deal of the maintenance themselves and the determination of the congregation and the people of Biggin Hill that when something is needed it will be done.

Moving forward in our faith and worship is an important aspect of St Mark's. We have changed our services to include an All Age Worship Service on the first Sunday of each month which is an informal service based on a different theme each month. We include more modern worship songs in this service as well as games and dramas. Many groups meet at the church, and you will find these advertised in this magazine. The community of St Mark's is a loving, open one and everyone is welcome.

This year is involving a lot of Moving at St Mark's. In June our vicar, Rev. Alison Newman retired and along with her husband Mark moved to their new home on the coast. At this point we have realised just how hard they worked and how much they did, that we now must manage ourselves. The Church Wardens, PCC Members and members of the congregation have had to step up and get things done which they have had little or no experience of. Often fitting new tasks into already busy lives. If anyone has any time, skills or is just willing, please do come to help.

The next big move is towards finding a new incumbent. Although the appointment is made by the Bishop of Rochester, we first have to provide a profile of the Parish. Up to about thirty pages describing the services, congregation, and activities in the Parish, all our challenges and hopes. The finances of the church, the outreach to the local community, the vicarage and much more.

Then we need to decide what type of candidate we would like to have, not an easy task. When all of this is done and the post advertised in appropriate media, the selection process will go ahead and when the appointment is made it will be a further four to six months before we are able to welcome the new incumbent to the parish.

The children have returned to school, autumn is coming, which means that Christmas is approaching. We will be having all of our usual events here at St Mark's, the Christmas Tree Exhibition, the Christmas Fayre, Carol Service, Christingle Services, Midnight Communion and this year an All Age Worship on Christmas morning. Please do come, join the celebration and if you're able, lend a hand too.

To Russia, with trepidation ... for 3 years

How did a 20 year-old girl end up in Moscow? Sandra Batrick grew up in Beckenham. On leaving Cator Park School at 15, she started work in Fortnum and Mason's staff restaurant. She transferred to the main kitchen, the first girl they'd ever had. First, the canapé department, then the salads, which is where she met Phil. This had to be their closely guarded secret! Work took her to Dunlop's head office, St James' Square. Someone from the Foreign Office came to Fortnum's, where Phil was still employed, asking if there was anyone willing to work as Chef to the British Ambassador in Moscow. As they were now married, Sandra was eligible to join him there. Complex security




clearance took 3 months. They landed in Moscow in November 1965, when Leonid Brezhnev was Soviet leader.

Two militia men marched up and down the aisle of the plane – an

intimidating start! Sandra's role was that of ladies' maid, which meant looking after the needs of the Ambassador's wife.

Sandra and Phil had a lovely flat in the embassy compound, right opposite the Kremlin. There was the ambassador's garden, tennis court and staff shop, and a British doctor. Food could be bought at the Diplomatic shop nearby. The only meat




available was fillet steak.

British MPs would come and visit, so there were many formal dinner parties. Harold Wilson and his wife came to stay. At the embassy there were three footmen and two butlers. Each summer a large garden party was held at the embassy. The harsh winters meant a norm of minus 10C. A short walk would give you ice in your nose, and white eyebrows.



Sandra and Phil were able to get to the Bolshoi Ballet. At that time in Moscow there were few cars, but after a year they bought a car, limited to a driving within a 25 mile radius. To visit the diplomatic dacha and river beach, you needed to give 48 hours' notice. Here, their car would be stopped at regular checkpoints.



The Ambassador's wife of their time, Katherine Harrison, wrote a book on life in Russia, and mentioned Phil and Sandra: 'The Batricks proved to be worthy successors [to the previous couple]. He too was a good chef, trained by Fortnum and Mason's, and experienced with the pressures of large-scale entertaining as he had frequently assisted at receptions and banquets at Buckingham Palace.'

Sandra and Phil returned to the UK in September 1968 at the time of torrential rain. Caroline was born 6 weeks after their

return from Russia, with Liz following 3 years later.

They found a house in Biggin Hill, where Sandra lived for 55 years. After continuing his work as chef at Wellcome Research, Phil changed career and became... a gardener! Sadly, he died in 2015.

Sandra has never been back to Russia. However, on her return to the UK she became a member of the St John Ambulance. She did one duty at Buckingham Palace during a Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award ceremony. One year she had the honour of processing the lamp down the aisle at Westminster Abbey at the annual Florence Nightingale Commemoration Service. She used to do duties at London theatres and the Churchill, voluntary work at Bromley Hospital and at the Biggin Hill airshow.





On the evening of Remembrance Sunday 2003, despite her fear of blood, Sandra found herself delivering her next-door neighbour's baby: Anne Nash, herself a nurse, had called at Sandra's asking for urgent help. With help from a paramedic on the phone, Sandra brought a new life into the world; to be precise, on her kitchen floor! The story reached the Sevenoaks Chronicle

Following an offer in the paper, Sandra and Phil applied for a flight on Concorde, from Seville to Heathrow. They were even shown into the cockpit.



A large part of Sandra's life has been spent with Westerham Bowls Club. Sandra got to know Vic during a bowls tour to Portugal in 2018. He had hit his head and she accompanied him to the hospital in the ambulance. And this is how they became an item!

NEW BLADDER CYSTOSCOPY COUCH TO CUT WAITING TIMES BY UP TO 50% FOR CANCER PATIENTS

Local charity, The Chartwell Cancer Trust, committed to providing support for NHS Services across London and the South-East, have launched an urgent appeal to raise £9,500 to purchase a vital piece of diagnostic

equipment for **Beckenham Beacon's Urology Unit**, part of **King's College Hospital NHS Foundation Trust**.

This life-saving equipment will help meet rising demand for bladder cancer diagnosis across South-East London, where referrals have soared, the surge partially attributed to increased public awareness following high-profile cases such as **His Majesty King Charles III** and **Olympic champion Sir Chris Hoy**.

Currently, the service at Beckenham Beacon can only perform essential bladder examinations known as **flexible cystoscopies** - in one clinical room. This equipment, a specialist diagnostic couch, will allow the service to double its capacity and reduce waiting times, with the aim of diagnosing suspected bladder cancer patients within 10 days of referral. This aligns with national NHS targets and can significantly improve treatment outcomes.

King's College Hospital NHS Foundation Trust provides cancer services for around one million people in South-East London, including the boroughs of Southwark, Lewisham, Greenwich, Bromley, Bexley and Lambeth, and is a national centre for specialist care.

The Chartwell Cancer Trust has already made a difference across the region by funding vital cancer equipment and support services. Now they are calling on the community to get behind this urgent appeal and help improve access to potentially life-saving diagnoses and have set up a Crowdfunder to raise the funds needed to make it happen.


New bladder cancer specialist diagnostic couch for Beckenham Beacon's Urology Department

Colourful Jewels of Autumn

To offer late season colour in shady spots, sunny borders, containers and naturalised in lawns, there is no better than planting autumn flowering bulbs to complement late flowering perennials or brightening up areas among finished perennials. Often spring flowering bulbs to plant now are available to purchase in most garden centres this time



of year. However, autumn flowering bulbs are just as easy to obtain and can also be purchased as plants, such as Cyclamen hederifolium.

Plant autumn flowering crocus with their dainty pinks and blue, mauve or pink blooms from September to October to encourage flowering in the same year. The most well-known

variety is Crocus sativa, the saffron crocus from which the spice comes from. Shorter and daintier with often long slender throats. There are

other species to choose from, preferring a sheltered sunny spot to perform well. Like their more robust cousin, Colchicum autumnale, with their larger pink blooms and no leaves, hence its common name, Naked Ladies, grows furiously the following spring. A good one to grow, resembling its shape, is called Waterlily.



Nerines, originally often seen along coastal

front gardens, have been regarded as tender. Today, given their preferred growing conditions of sunny sites and well-drained soil, can be grown today almost anywhere

given those growing conditions. Plant them with their neck well

exposed to the elements and will flower throughout October.

Commonly known as the autumn daffodil, Stenbergia Lutea, a Mediterranean native, does best in full sun, and well-drained soil. Can also be grown in pots, at the



front of the border or naturalised in grass. This clump forming bulbous perennial with narrow green leaves and deep yellow goblet shaped flowers will enhance any border.

One plant we see often in open gardens growing under trees, in the shade or the base of shrubs is Cyclamen hederiflolium or the ivy leaf

cyclamen. They can be seen at National Trust and RHS Gardens, flowering in shades of pink and white.

They can also be purchased either as a bulb or as a potted plant which is easier to plant and get established much more quickly than a bulb. Botanically a corm, the primary difference is that a corm is a solid, swollen stem storing food for the



plant, while a bulb is made of layers of fleshy, modified leaves. There are winter flowering species as well that clothe the ground, hugging and seeding themselves, with the help of the odd ant, and feeding on the sugar-coated seed coats.

Whatever the weather and time of year, there is always something to cheer about in the garden.

Bromley Trading Standards Protect yourself against doorstep crime

Whatever the work it is you need to have done, the advice is clear: do not deal with doorstep traders.

Do get several written quotes – prepare a clear detailed brief beforehand.

Do seek references, read reliable reviews, ask to visit previous jobs.

Do check directly with any reputable organisation named or whose logo is shown on a leaflet/website to make sure the trader is affiliated – if not, report to Bromley Trading Standards.

Do get a contract in writing before works commence. Check the terms and conditions. You should be entitled to a 14-day cooling off period – with full written cancellation information and not just a mention on a leaflet or a tick box to say you agree.

Do check and verify a trader's insurance.

Do be wary if you are asked to pay by cash or asked to pay a cheque or transfer money to an individual if they are unconnected with the trader/company you are dealing with.

Don't deal with traders at the door – it's okay to say no.

Don't contact traders via leaflets that are delivered through the door – without making thorough checks beforehand.

Don't pay large sums of money in advance – schedule payment as works **progress. Don't** accept that traders are members of an organisation because they use a **logo. Don't** be rushed into deciding – seek advice first from someone you trust.

We respect that we are all children of God, and we want to discover Christ in each other, encouraging personal growth in our individual relationship with each other and with Jesus.


Worship is an integral part of our love for God, and we want our services to reflect dignity and sensitivity as well as joy and thanksgiving.
